Brexit

Brexit is an ongoing challenge for the profession. We have been working tirelessly to influence key stakeholders including the UK Intellectual Property Office (UK IPO) and the EU Intellectual Property Office (EUIPO) as well as parliamentarians, government officials and intellectual property (IP) legal organisations.

The regular briefings and updates we have provided for members are more vital than ever to ensure our profession is as prepared as possible for the implications of Brexit.

Membership

Our membership base grew once again in 2019 with Student members making up of 35% of new joiners. We also saw a 5% increase in Ordinary members. It is great to see that the profession is growing and developing.

Events

In 2019, we continued to work towards delivering more events online. Throughout the year we hosted 12 webinars with 3,562 registered delegates in total.

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CITMA Paralegals

The continuing professional development scheme for CITMA Paralegals was launched - we saw high levels of take-up with 77% of eligible members on the scheme.

Conferences

Our autumn and spring conferences saw increases in attendance. The Autumn Conference took place at the ICC in Birmingham with over a hundred delegates joining us from across the UK to listen to a range of expert speakers.

Diversity and inclusion

2019 welcomed IP Inclusive's two newest communities - IP Ability and IP Futures.

IP Ability focuses on supporting people who have a disability

or anyone who cares for someone with a disability.

IP Futures supports those who are at the beginning of their careers, making sure they have the support and community needed when starting out.

As an organisation we remain committed to working on consultations and championing the profession's position on changes within the sector.

Looking forward

As we look to 2020, there will be new challenges ahead, but we make sure that we continue to build on our work to represent, promote and engage our members and the wider profession.






Representing the profession

Our focus for the future

Our goal is to be the leading UK organisation in the development, promotion and protection of the trade mark legal profession. We want to be valued by our members and seen as an important source of professional knowledge in the field of intellectual property law, with a focus on trade marks and designs.

Brexit

Brexit continued to bring uncertainty to the profession. The date the UK would leave the European Union was delayed on more than one occasion.

Our Brexit task-force members met with key stakeholders from across the world to fight for the best possible outcome.

We took our key messages to the U.S. in a series of roadshows with CIPA and the UK IPO. The roadshows allowed us to reassure the key U.S. market that the UK was operating as normal and that the profession would still be able to carry out work post-Brexit.

We also met with World Intellectual Property Office (WIPO) in Geneva to discuss no deal preparations and shared this with members.

Looking forward, we will be continuing to provide support for our members and communicating with key stakeholders to ensure we have a good outcome in a post-Brexit world.

Events

Our events focused on providing members from all categories with more learning and development opportunities to better equip and support them to be more successful.

In line with our third strategic goal, we provided more tailored learning for our members; including seminars with focuses on litigation, designs, global IP and more. To continue to make sure all members have access to educational events, we hosted over half of our lectures outside of London and delivered a total 12 webinars with a wide range of topics.

We will continue to deliver events that help upskill the profession and provide our members with the support and opportunity to be competitive and successful.

Diversity and inclusion

We want to ensure members have access to any information and support that they may need in the workplace. To do this, we continued to work alongside and promote the work of IP Inclusive – a collective initiative that was jointly launched by CITMA, CIPA and others in 2015.

We recognise that diversity and inclusion are important parts of any workplace or profession We are committed to championing diversity and inclusion and its why we remain committed to making sure our members have access to any support they require so they can be successful.

CITMA Paralegals

We continued to focus on bringing recognition to the important work of paralegals. 2019 was the first year of the CITMA Paralegal continuing professional development (CPD) scheme. The scheme was created to help recognise the importance of paralegals to the profession. To support the scheme, we also launched a brand-new competency framework for CITMA Paralegals that highlights the skills that are obtained as a CITMA Paralegal.

Our goal is to continue to upskill the profession in line with our competency frameworks for both CITMA Paralegals and Chartered Trade Mark Attorneys.

Law and practice committee

Our law and practice committee represents the profession across the globe at key stakeholder events to ensure our members' voices are heard.

The committee continues to meet regularly to discuss the latest developments in intellectual property law and to keep members up-to-date. The committee also continues to respond to consultations on behalf of the trade mark and design legal profession.


The committee works closely with our working groups to shape the profession so our members can continue to be successful.

Brexit

The threat of a no-deal exit and continued political uncertainty meant our role in keeping members up-to-date and fighting their corner was imperative.

A new UK Prime Minister arrived into Number 10 during 2019 and was backed by a strong majority. Despite Boris Johnson winning the UK General Election there were still doubts whether Brexit could get through the UK Parliament and if a no-deal exit could be stopped. These remained key factors in the uncertainty.




The UK was initially due to leave the EU on 29th March 2019, but with Parliament in a deadlock, we prepared for the UK to leave without a deal and the implications of falling off this 'cliff edge'.

We continued our engagement with key stakeholders in IP offices including the UK IPO, EUIPO and WIPO. This enabled us to give our members the latest guidance on what would happen in 'deal' and 'no-deal' scenarios in relation to professional representation and IP rights.

The UK IPO had previously confirmed that all exiting EU Trade Marks and Registered Community Designs on the EU's registers at the time of exit would be replicated on the UK register, even if there was a nodeal exit. This had provided some certainty – but there was still little certainty on rights of representation, so this remained our focus.

This 'cliff edge' was extended to the end of October and then further extended into early 2020. Naturally this brought uncertainty but we were able to keep our members updated every step of the way.

EUIPO exemptions

With confirmation of a further extension to the Brexit process, we sought guidance for the UK profession from the EUIPO on exemptions and requirements to remain on the register of representatives. This followed our attendance at the EUIPO user group meeting in Alicante.

The EUIPO set out the evidence required to prove "real and effective establishment" in an EEA member state, changing from a professional representative to legal practitioner and applying for exemptions as a UK national.

The guidance also covered changing from a professional representative to a legal practitioner and applying for exemptions as a UK national.

Subsequently members were informing us that requests for a second EUIPO ID were being rejected in many cases. We took this up with the EUIPO, which issued additional guidance to help the UK profession understand the process and what was needed for a successful application.

at APRAM's conference in France, travelled to South Korea and Japan to meet with key stakeholders in the local IP sectors. and attended ECTA amongst many other commitments.

All our international engagement had a focus on Brexit and promoting the UK as open for business.

We continued to engage with key parliamentarians, particularly the Minister for IP. Our message was

clear that UK professionals not being able to practice before the EUIPO would hurt business.

Parliamentary questions are an important way to

keep the issue on the agenda, and we had questions tabled on our behalf. The questions asked what government intends to do for Chartered Trade Mark Attorneys being able to represent clients before the EUIPO. All

Supporting our members

In 2019 we created a new section on our website signposting our members to the support available including LawCare, IP Inclusive and the CITMA Benevolent Fund.



Diversity and inclusion

Diversity is an important part of any workplace or profession and we are committed to championing diversity and inclusion within the intellectual property professions.

We predominantly do this through IP Inclusive, which we continue to play an active role in supporting and championing. We are represented on its management board by Keven Bader and Richard Goddard.

The launch of IP Ability, for people with disabilities, and IP Futures, for trainees and recently qualified practitioners, were key developments for IP Inclusive in 2019

Supporting through events

We invited Ann Charlton from LawCare to speak about the need to look after ourselves and our mental wellbeing at our Spring Conference and to a wider audience at a popular webinar attended by some 200 people.

We also promoted IP Inclusive's events on our website, via email and social media

Last year saw the introduction of CPD for IP Inclusive events and we continued to push this aspect to encourage attendance as part of our members' professional development.

Benevolent Fund

After a number of years of building up our pot of money for the first time the CITMA Benevolent Fund provided assistance to a member - this was an important milestone for the Fund.

We continued to raise money for the Fund in 2019. Our annual charity quiz night in London raised £2,000 split equally between the Fund and the winning team's chosen charity - Mind.

LawCare

We continued to promote the services of Law Care, which supports mental health and wellbeing in the legal community. We provided LawCare with stalls at some of our main events including the Spring and Autumn conferences

At our Spring Conference we once again supported London Wildlife Trust.

Supporting businesses

As well as our members we support businesses through IP Pro Bono The scheme provides support for individuals and small businesses involved in IP litigation, who are unable to afford professional advice.

We supported the scheme to help find new firms and attorneys to be part of IP Pro Bono.

Since its inception in 2016 we have continued to support IP Pro Bono. Our Immediate Past-President Kate O'Rourke is a key part of the management committee of the scheme

Membership

In 2019 we had a total of 1.712 members - an increase of 121 on the previous year.

We continue to work for our members and to be seen as a valued and important source of professional knowledge in the field of intellectual property law. We saw a 5% increase in our Ordinary membership category in 2019.

Since re-evaluating our strategic objectives in 2015 we have seen a 20% increase in our membership. Over the years we have focused what we do to better represent, promote and engage with our members and the wider profession.

CITMA Paralegal CPD Scheme

In 2019 we launched our continuing professional development (CPD) scheme for CITMA Paralegals.

The scheme develops trade mark paralegals, administrators and formalities staff working within our profession and brings recognition of the important role they play in the profession.

Members on the scheme must complete eight hours' CPD per year, which is self-certified. We saw 77% of eligible CITMA Paralegal members register to take part in the scheme and the CITMA Paralegals that were on the scheme recorded over 1.500 hours of CPD.

CITMA Paralegal Competency Framework

The CITMA Paralegal competency framework was published in 2019 to outline the key skill sets of a CITMA Paralegal. We recognise the important role that paralegals play in the profession, which is why we created the framework.

The CITMA Paralegal framework will help improve and develop the skills of CITMA Paralegals, while also bringing recognition to the work of CITMA Paralegals.

The framework includes technical skills, related to the understanding of legislation and management of trade marks and designs. The framework also includes general skills such as communication, conduct and ethics, self-awareness and development.

CITMA Paralegal Course

The 2019/20 course attracted some 100 participants. We shifted the start of the course to September, meaning there was no exam in 2019. This brought the course in line with the academic year.

National Paralegal Awards

We had two CITMA Paralegals as finalist at the 2019 National Paralegal Awards, Rebecca McBride and Roy Scott, who sadly passed away in 2019.



The awards showcase and celebrate paralegal talent from across the UK. They are organised by the Professional Paralegal Register.

Rebecca scooped first prize in the 'Best Trade Mark Paralegal' category. Rebecca is the first winner of a National Paralegal Award specifically for the trade mark legal sector.

CITMA Paralegal representative

Rebecca McBride finished her second year as CITMA Paralegal representative.



The CITMA Paralegal representative has the chance to sit on Council and be able to directly influence the discussions and decision-making process. The position is designed to offer more diversity and a broader representation of the membership on the Council.

Events

In 2019, 70% of our members registered for at least one event, which is a significant increase from 2018 which saw only 58% of members registering for events.



Our events committee focused on delivering a wider range of learning and development events to support all membership categories. We recognise our responsibility for helping to equip and support our membership to be competitive and successful.


More than half of our lectures were hosted outside of London to ensure as many members as possible a chance to attend, learn, develop and network with other members. We also hosted a total of 12 webinars, which aimed to be much more specific to tailor to the different membership categories, as well as offering more flexibility and accessibility. In total, our 12 webinars had 3,562 registered delegate places.

Webinar bookings doubled in 2019 compared to the previous year, partly thanks to a more userfriendly booking process on the new website we launched in 2018.

Spring Conference

Our Spring Conference in London welcomed delegates from Brazil, Israel, Turkey, India, Paraguay, and beyond.

As well as providing expert speakers from around the globe, we treated delegates to a 360-degree view of London at Altitude 360 for our conference dinner.

Communications

With our brand-new website launched towards the end of last year our communications plan focused on maximising this investment to promote, engage with and support our members.

This new platform has allowed us to present information in a more engaging way than ever before. We have reached new audiences and created deeper engagement with our core membership.

In 2019 we attracted some 3,000 more individual visitors to our website than we did in the previous year and 10,000 more than in 2017.

Promoting our members

A key pillar of our website is to promote our members and their work to help them to be successful. To encourage would-be clients towards our members and aware of Chartered Trade Mark Attorneys we promote the importance of IP. Our blog does this in an engaging an entertaining way using topical and high-profile examples to pique the interest of the business community and wider public.

We always use these to make the link between protecting and maximising the potential of businesses' trade marks and designs with the expertise of Chartered Trade Mark Attorneys.

Articles on a wide range of topics including McDonald's, Bitcoin and The Apprentice all contributed to over 7,000 unique views of our blog posts.



Using this kind of content to drive traffic to our website is vital in creating greater interest in using the services of a Chartered Trade Mark Attorney. Our directory, linking would-be clients with appropriate attorneys, created more than 8,000 new potential leads for our members in 2019.

Valuable member content

We upped the volume of published resources that keep members upto-date with the latest trade mark and design law and practice.

In addition to providing all case comments published in CITMA Review online we commissioned

more timely case reviews that were published days rather than months after the case decision being issued.

Our events are a great source of valuable content that help share knowledge across the profession. We published videos all our recorded events, which were viewed more than 2,000 times.

Important updates on practice before the UK IPO and EUIPO in particular were published in our news section. In total we received 50,716 content engagements in 2019.





Social media

We came into 2019 with a wellestablished presence on Twitter, but without an equivalent following on LinkedIn - a platform that is more widely used by our members. We sought to grow our following on LinkedIn which would help us to target members in particular.

We increased our follower numbers from a low level to over 600 on LinkedIn with a strong engagement base for future development.

Email

Email remains the most important method of reaching and engaging with our members. To get all the new content we have been publishing since the launch of our updated website in front of our members we primarily use our email newsletter.

In 2019 we increased the click rate on our newsletters from an average of 40% in 2018 to 56% in 2019 showing a sizeable increase in engagement. We try to ensure the content we are serving up in our newsletter is important, timely and is of interest to our members

We started using our website's platform for sending our emails, this allows up to include content specific to each user – so each member has the potential to see an email tailored to their status and preferences.

We also use email as the primary way to promote events. The engagement in our events increased dramatically - with an additional 2,800 event bookings in 2019.

Our new website handled 5,409 event registrations in 2019 – a significant increase on the previous year. We also ran bookings for our Christmas Lunch via our website for the first time.

Communications team

Our communications team increased in 2019. For the first time we appointed a Communications Officer, with the role holder taking up the position in October.

This give us additional capacity to create more content and develop our communications to further build on the investment in the website and digital systems.

Law and Practice

Our Law and Practice Committee leads our work on responding to proposed changes to IP law and practice on behalf of our members as well as keeping them up-to-date on the latest developments.

The UK Intellectual Property Office (UK IPO)

Members of the committee's UK IPO working group continued, along with

our officers, to attend the quarterly marks and designs forum (MDF). A group dedicated to trade mark and design law and practice, in addition to attending the UK IPO's stakeholder meetings.

As has now become a custom, the committee hosted termly visits by senior officers of the UK IPO to its own committee meetings,

which provides us with updates as to the latest and upcoming

developments at the UK IPO.

In return, we can raise directly with the officers of the UK IPO questions on matters of policy or particular points of practice that may be

causing difficulty for our members.

The committee has also continued to work with the UK IPO in connection with its marshalling schemes of hearing officers.



European Union Intellectual Property Office (EUIPO)

Our President, Tania Clark, supported by our Chief Executive, Keven Bader, attended the EUIPO's annual user group and anti-scam meetings. Other regular meetings in Alicante, Brussels and Toledo, including CP8, CP11 (workstream two) and CP12, were attended by the committee's chair and members of the EUIPO working group throughout the year.

Members of the EUIPO and designs & copyright working groups also continued to attend the EUIPO stakeholder quality assurance panel meetings in July.

The committee responded during the year to a number of EUIPO consultations and questionnaires regarding CP initiatives. The committee's chair also attended an EUIPO Tertulia in Brussels to discuss the impact of new case law on EU trade mark practice.

World Intellectual Property Organisation (WIPO)

The lead of the WIPO working group, Oscar Benito, attended the annual WIPO meetings in Geneva in July. Oscar also attended the British Day at WIPO in Geneva with our President Tania Clark and Peter Brownlow.

The group continued to collaborate with the UK IPO and WIPO throughout the year on substantive issues relating to international registrations

The group continued to collaborate with the UK IPO and WIPO throughout the year on substantive issues relating to international registrations, including ensuring that the issues raised within the UK position paper listing our priorities continued to be focused on by the international bureau as a short-term priority.



European Sisters Organisation

The annual meeting of the European Sister Organisations was held in Cologne in March and was attended by our President, Tania Clark and Chief Executive, Keven Bader, as well as representatives from APRAM, BMM, GRUR, ECTA, MARQUES and UNION.

This annual meeting of European stakeholder associations, whose principal interest is in trade marks and designs, provides a useful forum for discussion of matters of mutual interest in the field, including the impact of Brexit.

Designs and copyright

The designs and copyright working group had a busy year in 2019, including organising and hosting the CITMA Intensive Designs Seminar the day before the Spring Conference.

The working group submitted comments to the UK IPO on the five-year review of the changes brought about by the Intellectual Property Act 2014.

The committee also submitted questions to be put to the copyright directive rapporteur, commenting on the CP10 consultation, and making a submission to the European Commission on the design's regime in Europe.

Litigation

The litigators' working group continued to attend the IP court and IPEC users' committees and its review of IPEC guidelines.

Our annual Litigation Seminar was held in November and once again it was well attended.

Organisation of the marshalling scheme with the IPEC judges was also continued and discussions regarding the possibility of expanding the marshalling scheme to High Court judges were ongoing.

Other projects

The committee continues to review case referrals to the General Court and European Court of Justice.

In respect of emerging markets, the committee continued to liaise with the UK IPO attachés for China, south east Asia. India and Brazil.

Education

Responsibility for education is an important part of our role. We continue to monitor the route to qualification for aspiring Chartered Trade Mark Attorneys and the performance of the examination agencies accredited by IPReg.

We want to make sure that the courses maintain high standards.

We were concerned to hear of a number of issues being raised by students sitting the Queen Mary University of London (QMUL) course. We took the feedback we received very seriously and engaged with the appropriate people to seek change.

In 2019 we prepared to launch our new competency framework for Chartered Trade Mark Attorneys. The framework was created to support the progression and development of Chartered Trade Mark Attorneys, as well as bringing recognition to the skill sets of an experienced Chartered Trade Mark Attorneys.

It was created to be a natural follow-on from IPReg's competency framework for trainee trade mark attorneys.





Queen Mary University of London (year one students)

There were 44 students who registered on the programme for the Certificate in Trade Mark Law and Practice, with 42 passing the course.

Bournemouth University

(year one students)

There were 17 students who opted to take the Postgraduate Certificate in Intellectual Property course as the route to becoming a qualified Chartered Trade Mark Attorney, with all passing the course.

Nottingham Law School

(year two students)

There were 45 new students enrolled on the Professional Certificate in Trade Mark Practice course, with 39 passing first time.




